

On August 7, 2025, Memory Wollenweber passed away due to a fall. Memory was installed as our Colorado State 1st Vice President at our June 2025 state convention. Memory's nomination acceptance letter is reprinted here in full. It shows the attitude that Memory had about DKG and about life. Her kindness and smile will be remembered by those who were blessed to know her.



If we are fortunate enough, we have women in our lives who love us, guide us, and mentor us. For me, those women were all teachers. Because of my grandmother, I knew by the age of eight that I wanted to become a teacher just like her. She began her teaching career in a one room schoolhouse on the Colorado prairie and became fast friends with a teacher in a neighboring school. The friend became my "Auntie Pep". Her name was Bertha Campbell who went on to become a Jefferson County principal and a proud member of Pi Chapter, Omega State, The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. My third great fortune was to have Naomi Kullerstrand Olson as my third grade teacher and principal. I will never forget the love that she showed me and the feeling of being special in my teacher's eyes. It's a need all children have, and the memory lasts a lifetime. Naomi was a founder of Omega State and the first president of Pi Chapter.

When I became a teacher, it was my Auntie Pep's dream for me to become a member of Delta Kappa Gamma. She didn't live long enough to see it come true. But, her friends, Rose Stein and Freda Rizzari saw it through to fruition. I had the great honor and pleasure of chauffeuring Naomi to Pi functions and

State Conventions. There were many "greats" in Pi Chapter when I became a member: women dedicated to the purposes of DKG with schools named in their honor – Ilene Deane, Marjorie Thomson, Bertha Campbell, Naomi Kullerstrand Olson. My life is far richer for knowing these inspirational leaders.

It is with a grateful heart that I accept the nomination for Corresponding Secretary of Colorado State in honor of our past and with a vision for our future.

Memory is a retired educator from Jefferson County Public Schools where she taught elementary students for 35 years. She received both her Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education and Master of Arts in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Northern Colorado. As a member of Pi Chapter, Memory has served as President (two terms) and 1 st Vice President and a member of Omega State Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee. She also served as Colorado State Recording Secretary for two terms.

Memory is a Member of Trinity Presbyterian Church, Making Choices Teacher and Mentor (pairing professional women with incarcerated women at Denver Women's Correctional Facility), Yoga Instructor, Board of Directors Arvada West High School Foundation, Arvada Historical Society and Denver Audubon Society.


So, you know:

# Colorado Librarian Partners with End Witch Hunts to Bring Historical Education to Students

When Jennifer Tozer, librarian at Pueblo Community College, set out to create an ambitious month-long educational program about the Salem Witch Trials, she knew she needed expert guidance to connect historical events to contemporary issues. That's when she reached out to Sarah Jack, Director of End Witch Hunts, a Colorado-based nonprofit organization.

### From Historical Interest to Modern Relevance

Tozer's passion project, "Witch Trials: Accusation to Exoneration," began as a way to bring Salem's history to students who might never visit Massachusetts. But she wanted the program to be more than just a history lesson. "I really wanted to start with something that people would be interested in and might draw them in, but then also talk about why it's still relevant," Tozer explained during a recent podcast interview.

### **Expert Consultation Makes the Connection**

Sarah Jack, whose organization works to raise awareness about modern-day witchcraft accusations worldwide, provided crucial consultation during the program's development. As a descendant of Rebecca Nurse, one of the Salem victims, Jack brought both personal connection and professional expertise to the collaboration

Jack, who participates in DKG International's DKGNext program, serves as Recording Secretary for DKG Colorado and is a member of the Aurora DKG Chapter Alpha Iota, combines her podcasting and social science expertise with her advocacy work. Her involvement in Delta Kappa Gamma International, the professional honor society for women educators, adds another layer of educational expertise to the partnership.

"I was so thrilled that you were interested in doing this," Jack shared, acknowledging the challenges Tozer faced building the program from scratch when traditional museum exhibits aren't available.

#### **Bridging Past and Present**

Through Jack's guidance, the program successfully connects 17th-century witch trials to ongoing issues of injustice today. The collaboration ensures students understand that while Salem feels like ancient history, similar accusations and persecutions continue worldwide.

"We think Salem and we think it's forever ago and what does that have to do with me?" Tozer noted. "If you think about it, it really wasn't that long ago, and these things still happen today."

#### **Community Impact**

Jack will present to Pueblo Community College students as one of several expert presentations throughout October, alongside special author talks featuring Kathleen Kent (*The Heretic's Daughter*) and Daniel Gagnon (*A Salem Witch*). This collaboration demonstrates how local expertise can enhance educational programming, bringing awareness about End Witch Hunts' global mission directly to the community.

The partnership showcases how education and advocacy nonprofits and higher education institutions can work together to make historical education both engaging and relevant to contemporary social justice issues.

You can hear more about this collaboration in "Bringing Witch Trial History to Students: A Librarian's Creative Educational Program" on The Thing About Witch Hunts podcast.

"Witch Trials: Accusation to Exoneration" runs throughout October at Pueblo Community College Library, featuring exhibits, author presentations, and community discussions.

Hank the Cowdog by John R. Erickson is one of the funniest series I have ever read. Each book is told from the perspective of Hank, the ranch "Head of Security". Hank is assisted in his efforts by Drover. Other characters in the series are High Loper (ranch owner), Sally Mae (High Loper's wife), Slim (hired man), Little Alfred (High Loper's and Sally Mae's son). Let's not forget the rest of the animal characters! There's Beulah, Hank's One True Love; Madame Moonshine, the psychic owl; Wallace and Junior, father and son buzzards; The Coyote Family, Rip, Snort, Scraunch, and Missy Coyote; Plato the bird dog; and last but not least, Pete the Cat.

Every book in the series deals with another of Hank's adventures. In the first book, <u>The Original Adventures of Hank the Cowdog</u>, Hank is falsely accused of killing one of Sally Mae's chickens. His feelings are hurt and he runs away from home, only to meet Missy Coyote, the beautiful sister of the Coyote Brothers. Hank decides that he has fallen in love with Missy but he has to prove himself to her brothers, Rip, Snort, and Scraunch. Along the way, Hank meets several other quirky characters and the laughs are frequent.

I love reading these books aloud to kids. Kids really appreciate the slapstick humor that Erickson employs. One of my favorite examples

of this is the fact that Hank always bathes in Emerald Pond and thinks that he comes out smelling sweet. Emerald Pond is the septic tank overflow. The books are so much fun to read, but if you really want a treat, find one of the audiobooks and listen to John R. Erickson read them. He uses different voices for the various characters and he never gets mixed up when it comes to which voice goes with each character. Mr. Erickson is a former ranch hand. He owns a ranch in the Texas Panhandle and knows first hand the struggles of ranching. In 2019, he was inducted into the Texas Literary Hall of Fame and his stories have won numerous awards.

(The first intersection after I-25.) Go for 0.1 mi., and then turn left onto S. Meridian Blvd., go for 0.5 mi.; Turn left onto Bierstadt Way. Go for 207 ft., Turn left. Go for 72 ft., turn right, then turn left and go for 154 ft. You will see a sign for Hilton Garden Inn. Parking is complimentary outside the hotel.
